- On the right of this assignment page are a canary and a wasp. Notice that both animals have a bright yellow color on their bodies. You will be reading about a canary in your lesson this week.
- Complete Lesson 13 in your *B is for Bear* textbook, volume 1. I hope that you enjoy the riddles. Be sure to bring your answers to class, as those who can get all five riddles will get a knowledge point!

- Complete Lesson 13 of your handwriting book.
 - Memorize Robert Frost’s “Gathering Leaves,” stanzas 1–3. We went over the following in class:
 - * *elude* (escape).
 - * Again, the humor of the poem is derived from overstatement, or *hyperbole*. The piles of leaves are called *mountains*.
 - * There is ridiculous visual humor, or *slapstick*, in this poem as well. Most readers will chuckle at the image of leaves flowing over into a person’s face.
 - Students should write out Dictation 13 (below). Parents should be writing misspelled words down on the dictation page and going over it.
