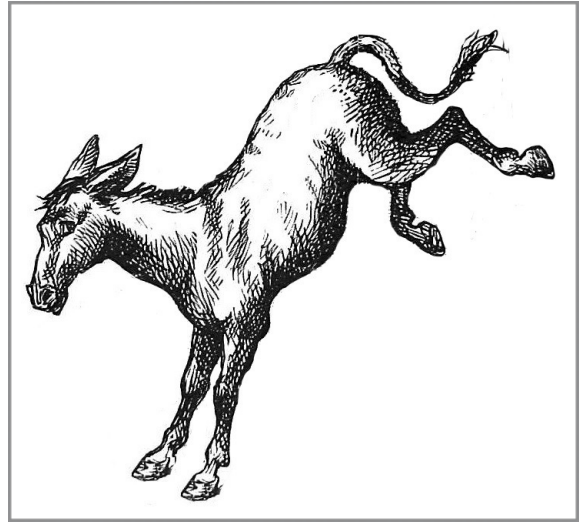


C is for Cottage
