The Personal Narrative Assignment 14

- poem. Memorize section 2 of Christina Rossetti's, "Summer is Ended."
- reading. Complete Lesson 14 in your study guide and the corresponding reading of Charles Dickens and William Henry Hudson. Probably the most famous and most enduring Victorian novelist is Charles Dickens. Dickens wrote a total of fourteen novels, including Oliver Twist, Great Expectations, David Copperfield, Little Dorrit, A Christmas Carol, and A Tale of Two Cities. Dickens also wrote an amusing and rather scorching review of the United States titled American Notes. After his tour of 1842, Dickens wrote his mostly unfavorable impressions of America. He was not the first, however, as Anthony Trollope's mother Frances Trollope won fame and fortune ten years previous for an "expose" of American ways in her work *Domestic* Manners of the Americans (1832). Dickens' descriptive narrative of Washington D.C. is taken from American Notes. Less famous and enduring is the English-speaking South American author William Henry Hudson (1841–1922), who was born in Buenos Aires of American parents but became an English citizen. Like Thoreau, Hudson was a naturalist, making observations of plants, birds and other animals.
