
Classical Greek Assignment 17

- We now come to a very pessimistic quotation from Bias of Priene, who said that: Οἱ πλείστοι ἀνθρωποι κακοί. (Most people are bad.) Be prepared to compare this statement with what the Apostle Paul meant when he quotes the Psalmist, "None is righteous, no, not one; no one understands; no one seeks for God. All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one." (Romans 3:11–12 NASB)
- Read chapters 104–107 of **Guerber's Story of the Greeks**.
- To this point, we have been going over only SECOND, or odeclension words. We have gone over the masculine second declension, which end in oς, as well as the neuter second declension, which end in ov. Here are two example words λόγος (Masculine); ἔργον (neuter). We are now going over the first declension. (Memorize the following vocabulary:
