#### READING QUESTIONS A

1. Why does the one man want another job?

The one young man wants a new job closer to the city so that he would not have to take the train. A new job might also pay more so that he could afford a better way of life. Essentially, then, the young man is not content with his life as it is. Parents may point out that it is not wrong to have ambitions for a better life, but that it is also important for us to be able to be content with whatever situation we find ourselves in.

2. Why does John want a new bike?

John wants a new bike for the same reasons that the man wants a new job—he is not content. Although he was happy with the one that his father gave him, he was made discontent by seeing his friend's new one. Parents may bring up the psychological truth that when we see what other people do not have, we become jealous and discontent. Parents would do well to understand that children who are showered with late night parties, expensive toys and vacation trips to exotic places often grow up jaded, as there remain a few privileges, special gifts, and places to go that are new and exciting to them. There is a reason that the word "ennui" is often associated with the privileged class.

- 3. Does the mother think that new bicycles are better than old ones?

  The mother does not say that she believes the friend's bike is better, but instead points out the fact that John only thinks it is better because it is new.
- 4. Why is John's baby sister so happy?

  John's sister is happy because, as the mother said, "she just is." The conclusion of the short passage teaches us that learning how to be content with what we have in life is so important. It also teaches us the value of simple pleasures, such as personal contact with those we love.
