
B is for Bear Assignment 19

In addition to reviewing the "ar" and "aw" letter combinations (found in Lesson 5), prepare for this week's lesson by writing out any number of the following words for the students on the board (for classroom instruction) or a piece of paper (for one-onone lessons). The *dge* letter combination makes the sound of the letter *j*.

edge, badge, hedge, pledge, wedge, ledge, sledge, gadget, badger, bridge, ridge, budge, nudge, judge, trudge, sludge, fudge, pudgy, smudge, lodge, knowledge
