
Classic Works Assignment 14

- Memorize stanzas 1-3 of Alfred Tennyson's poem "Crossing the Bar." I will have you recite all three stanzas in our lesson.
- Read Frederic Brown's "Earthmen Bearing Gifts" and "Keep Out"; William Bova's The Next Logical Step"; and H. G. Wells' "The Star." Complete the study guide material on these stories.
- The picture on the right is of H. G. Wells, one of the most popular of all classic science fiction writers.

Long Range Assignments

 Your allegorical fantasy will be due the first week of January when you return from the break. Here are some examples of what other students wrote in the past.



- Your book report will be due the second week in January.
- You will be writing a critical essay on one of the science fiction stories that we have read. The essay will be due the **fourth week** of January. The assignment is to choose one of the stories to write on, identify its theme or effect, and then think about how the author develops it through the details of the story, such as through its characters, setting, plot development, symbols, dialog, word choice, etc. Follow the example format that I gave in class for "One out of Ten": The author creates a mood of paranoia reminiscent of the Red Scare through 1) the setting of the familiar all-American
