ANSWER KEY FOR LESSON 7 OF C IS FOR COTTAGE

LESSON IN MANNERS

The story that students are about to read features one of the most famous authors of the 17th century and early 18th century, Jonathan Swift (1667–1745). Swift was born in Ireland, but his father was English and he became a priest in the Church of England. His works are mostly satirical. The "Mr. Boyle" talked about in the passage might be Charles Boyle, the 4th Earl of Orrery (1676–1731). Like Swift, Boyle was a man of letters, but also fought as a general in the War of Spanish Succession. After students read the selection and answer the multiple choice questions, teachers can lead a discussion of the material with the following questions.

- 1. Who was acting rudely in this passage? In what way was he acting rude?

 One might argue Jonathan Swift was the first offender in that in the first two times that the servant came he did not offer a tip. Many servants in the time of this account would have depended on the generosity of those who were more wealthy. The servant, however, was inexcusably rude in return.
- 2. Do people act rude because they are intentionally mean or do they not know how to be polite?
 - Some people may think that people are rude because they want to be. It may be argued, however, that most people just do not know any better. They were not taught to say thank you or to be kind to others.
- 3. Think of times in which you were rude to others or when others were rude to you. What is our best response to those who are rude to us?

 The best response is to be polite in response to rudeness and speak directly to the person who

has offended us. In the story, however, the servant was rude back when instead he should have accepted the rudeness of Swift or politely spoke to the servant about her master's rudeness.
