Assignment 1

- The following Greek quotation should be easy to memorize. It consists of only five words, two of which are repeated:

ἀεὶ κολοῖός παρὰ κολοῖῳ ἰζάνει.

“A jackdaw always is found near a jackdaw” or rendered more literally, “A jackdaw always sits beside a jackdaw.” An English equivalent of this Greek saying is “Birds of a feather flock together.” The analysis of the saying is featured below.

- Make sure that you are able to do the following: 1) recite the Greek alphabet from alpha to omega. 2) recognize the capitals and lower case 3) Be able to write all of the letters, given the name of the letter 4) know the sounds of the letters and the diphthongs. Refer to sections 1–5 in Davis.
- Review vocabulary from last year by studying sections 10, 22, 30, 33, 46, 55, 57 in Davis. I will quiz you in class!
- Review the tenses that we went over last year: present and imperfect, active and passive voice. Also, review the second declension, masculine and neuter: the article ὁ, λόγος, ἄνθρωπος, οὐρονός, δοῦλος and ἔργον (neuter). You can find the declensions in Davis, chapters 5–9 (V–IX).
